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Introduction

Ascon Group

Southern Africa Coal at a Glance

- South Africa is the biggest producer with congested Richards Bay Coal Terminal and Durban as export gateways
- Mozambique emerging as a big player but has capacity constraints at Maputo, Beira and Nacala
- Zimbabwe has high quality +7,200kcal/kg low ash coals
- Botswana still a frontier producer with vast underdeveloped coal resources
- South Africa's coal quality is on a rapid decline

Strategy

- Our strategy is to be nimble traders of Southern African coal where distinctive capabilities and regional models enable us to stretch performance in a sustainable way
- By maintaining financial discipline and continually optimising our portfolio we will deliver sector leading total investor returns and competitive pricing
- As only coal exporter at Walvis Bay there are no allocation constraints.
- Faster vessel transit times and cheaper chartering rates to Europe with no Suez transit compared to Richards Bay Coal Terminal

Port

Namibia Railways

- Namibia's rail network consists of 2 382 route-km of tracks of 1 067 mm gauge.
- The main railway line runs north-south from the town of Upington in the north-western Cape, at Nakop.
- A branch line goes to the small Namibian harbour of Lüderitz while the main line continues northwards through the towns of Keetmanshoop and Mariental to Windhoek, 865 km from Nakop.
- A second main line through Usakos and Swakopmund connects the Namibian capital of Windhoek to the country's major port of Walvis Bay.
- Another branch line from Windhoek goes eastward to the livestock town of Gobabis.
- The south west-north east spine from Walvis Bay joins the main line from the south through Windhoek at Kranzberg/Usakos junction & runs north through Otjiwarongo to the mining and farming towns of Outjo, Grootfontein and Tsumeb.
- The non-extension of the railway beyond Outjo, Grootfontein and Tsumeb, the northern terminals, may be an impediment to the agricultural development of the areas of the north and the north-east in the Owambo regions and the Okavango with the highest rainfalls in the country.




